P.E. and Sports Premium Funding Report: Review of 2024–25

and

P.E. and Sports Premium Funding Action Plan 2025–26

How much P.E. and Sports Premium Funding did we receive in 2024–2025?

In 2024–2025, St Denys Primary School received **£17,800** in P.E. and Sport Premium funding from the DfE. This funding is provided to improve the quality of P.E., sport and physical activity provision for all pupils and must be used to make **additional and sustainable improvements** to the provision of physical education.

The funding is split across two instalments, received in November and May.

Summary: How the money was spent

Our school recognises the importance of high-quality P.E. and sport in promoting pupil wellbeing, physical development, social skills, and academic achievement. The 2024–25 Sports Premium was spent in line with the **DfE's 5 Key Indicators**:

1. Employing a P.E. Specialist (Mr Fielder) – £13,000

- Delivers high-quality curriculum P.E. lessons
- Supports staff through coaching and CPD
- Leads after-school clubs and lunchtime activities
- Manages assessment of pupil progress in P.E.
- Raises the profile of P.E. across the school

2. Lunchtime Physical Activity Zones – £1,500

- Teaching Assistants redeployed to lead structured activities
- Activities included ball games, skipping, basketball, and tennis skills
- Promotes 30 minutes of daily physical activity in line with the Chief Medical Officer's guidelines

3. Catch-Up Swimming for Y5/6 – £500 and Year 4 Swimming programme £2000

- Focused on pupils at risk of not achieving swimming requirements by end of KS2

4. Access to Competitive Sport & Enrichment – £1,000

- Staff cover and transport to external events, competitions, and Park Runs
- Support for after-school clubs in external venues
- Minibus hire for inter-school competitions

Additional School Budget Contributions (Beyond the Premium)

We also used additional funding from the school budget to enhance P.E. provision:

- Purchase of **additional sports resources** to widen participation
- Video and photographic **evidence collection** of pupil progression
- Increased **attendance at Southampton School Games**
- Regular **Y4 swimming blocks** and Y5/6 catch-up sessions
- Participation in **Hampshire SEND Sports Festival**
- Ensured **Pupil Premium pupils accessed at least one physical after-school club**
- Appointed two **Sports Captains** from Year 6 as P.E. Ambassadors

What impact has the Sports Premium made?

General Impact

- All P.E. lessons are now judged to be **Good or better**
- Pupils understand what they are learning and how to progress using a consistent assessment framework
- High engagement and enthusiasm for physical activity
- Clear emphasis on achieving **personal bests**, developing resilience and self-improvement
- **Sports Star of the Week** award and learning power framework motivate pupils
- Growing '**Sports Achievement**' **Wall** promotes active lifestyles beyond school
- Clear progress across all year groups, including pupils with SEND and Pupil Premium

Evidence of Improved Standards

Attainment and Progress in P.E. (2023/24 Data)

- **172 pupils** working at **Age Related Expectations**
- **16 pupils** working **above expected standard**
- Pupils working below expected levels are primarily in lower key stage cohorts
- All pupils, including disadvantaged and SEND, are making **good progress from their starting points**

Swimming Outcomes (2023/24)

- **52%** of Y6 pupils met the national swimming requirement:
 - Swim competently, confidently and proficiently over at least 25 metres
 - Use a range of strokes effectively
 - Perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations

Note: The school is working toward 100% compliance with new 2025 DfE expectations by offering **enhanced swimming provision in Year 4 and catch-up in Y5/6.**

After School Clubs: Participation Trend

We have significantly increased access to after-school and lunchtime clubs, particularly among pupils eligible for Pupil Premium.
